Hearts of Hope: Live Love - Live LENT

Last year we spent Lent and Easter in lockdown, and although we shall have some sort of roadmap out of Lockdown #3 by the time you read this, it is likely that we shall be in a similar situation this year too. No wonder we are all feeling somewhat less spring like than we might! Let's face it folks, we could do with a different sort of Lent to the one we mistake for a wallow in sack cloth and ashes and the wrath of God. We need 'Love' and LENT is all about love. Lent is the time when followers of Jesus pause, take stock, and review how they live their lives as we prepare once again to remember that with Jesus, 'Death does not have the final word'.

At the end of Lent comes Good Friday, when we remember the love of God for ALL the world on the cross where Jesus died. Then comes Easter Day, when we celebrate that love brings life and joy to the world. So our challenge this year is to 'Live Love - Live Lent' and a full list of everything on offer in the Benefice to help us think about what this means is included in the magazine. Basically, however, it is all about generosity, love and living in a way that brings hope to others and this is something you can do whatever your faith or spirituality.

Imagine being out on a walk and spotting love hearts in every house window, on notice boards, in shop windows, at the pub - love hearts saying thank you, asking for prayers, saying you miss someone. Love hearts remembering a life, love hearts with rainbows saying God loves all people equally, love hearts with a favourite bible or spiritual quote, love hearts with a candle inside...

A whole window full of them, draped with fairy lights, a big wooden heart at the gate offering help to a neighbour - 'I'm going to the tip - can I take a bag of stuff for you?'... Whatever you can think of that would bring a smile to someone's face on their daily walk.

Headlines from Avebury Parish Council's online meeting on 2 February 2021

Road safety: Wiltshire Council has agreed to start statutory consultation on two proposals: (1) to reduce the speed limit on the A4361 from 60mph to 50mph between Beckhampton and Avebury and northwards from Avebury and (2) to fill the gaps in the primrose double lines on the verges of the B4003 (presumably repairing the severely degraded sections first). We decided to make an application to the Marlborough Area Board for funding to support the purchase of two Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs). Temporary installations at the start of the 30mph restriction, they will prompt drivers to reduce speed. The SIDs will also be available to other parishes for occasional use.

West Kennett: Wiltshire Council has upheld our request to keep the emergency call payphone at the layby. BT has agreed to put the phone box back on the list for repainting and refurbishment. Thanks to all parishioners who actively supported our campaign to protect this vital service.

Beckhampton: A replacement mirror will soon be installed to help drivers negotiating the sharp bend at the west end of the village. We continue to try to identify the owner of the steps leading into the village from the layby opposite the Waggon and Horses with a view to deciding how to provide the handrail requested. The parish council recorded its thanks to its former colleague Dave Brotheridge, who had painted the bus shelter by the pub.

Wanted: Any information about the ownership of the steps from the Waggon and Horses lay-by into Beckhampton!

Planning applications: We supported an application from Rob Hues to lay an access route for occasional tractors and private vehicles over a field behind buildings at Galtee More Farm for which planning permission was recently granted for conversion into holiday lets. We were reassured to hear that HGVs will continue to use the existing access route off the A4 close to the car park at Silbury Hill and that the proposed access is of a design not likely to damage any buried archaeology.

National Trust update: Subject to further guidance, the Trust hopes to reopen before Easter with a booking system for the Manor Gardens, limited on-the-day walk-up tickets to the Stables Gallery of the Alexander Keiller Museum, and a take-away service from Circles Restaurant. The NT shop and Cobblestones will reopen in due course. The main car park remains closed for as long as social distancing rules make it impossible for pedestrians to pass safely on the footpaths to the village.

Rights of Way: The parish council wrote on 20 January to Richard Clewer (Deputy Leader, Wiltshire Council) drawing his attention to the abject condition of AVE14, which runs from the new barns at the turn to Yatesbury and South Street. At certain places this is more or less impassable for pedestrians. He has also been asked to consider how to prevent vehicles accessing the Ridgeway at Overton Hill during October to April.

Date of next meeting: 2 March at 19h30. Residents wishing to participate in this meeting are most welcome to do so. Draft minutes of this meeting may be found on the Avebury

News from the Tower

At the beginning of each year, I have to write an Annual Report with all the events that have taken place in the tower, Guild and the Calne Branch in the previous year. These records have been kept, at Avebury, since the re-establishment of the 6 bells. It has to be hand written in a large ledger which was presented to the Bell ringers by Mrs. Betty Blake in memory of her husband Vernon. The first quarter peal on the new bells was rung half muffled for Vernon. Some of the items that are recorded are visiting bands, peals, quarter peals, weddings, special rings, State occasions, royal births, weddings, birthdays etc., Branch meetings including those at Avebury, Guild and Branch AGMs, recruitment, Branch Carol services, outings and registered ringers.

Due to the pandemic the 2020 report is extremely short; the Branch AGM in January, a quarter peal on the 4th March and the Branch meeting at Avebury on 14th March, everything else was cancelled. The final very sad entry is the loss, in October, 2020, of our very good friend and faithful ringer for many years, Heather Peak-Garland.

The Diocese of Salisbury suggested that ringers might toll a single bell 100 times in all the churches on Sunday, 31st January, 2021 at 12 noon, to mark the 100,000 covid deaths. The sad tolling of a tenor bell can be very moving and it made the loss of so many lives feel very real

Local Produce

One of the aims of the shop is to sell as much local produce as possible. Here are the details of some of our local producers.

Brinkworth Dairy supply us with cheese including Wiltshire Loaf, Royal Bassett Blue and Silbury Hill smoked cheese. They are also supply creamy yogurts. Berkeley Farm Dairy from Wroughton produce delicious organic milk, cream and butter. Customers love the taste of these – so different from standard supermarket produce.

Sumbler's butchers from Marlborough supply a range of bacon, sausages, black pudding, charcuterie, chops and mince. We can also take orders for your Sunday roast joint.

Little Bag of Herbs supply jams and chutneys using as much home grown produce as possible.

Vicarage Lane cakes make a range of loaf cakes and flapjacks which are very popular.

Ramsbury brewery supply us with a range of beers, gin, vodka and Black Gold rape seed oil.

Our eggs come from Paxcroft Farm which is between Devizes and Trowbridge.

BLESSING OF THE BELL ST MARY MAGDALENE, WINTERBOURNE MONKTON

After only a month away the Tenor Bell (cast in 1663) was returned on 15 February to be re-hung in the church tower and connected to the electronic chimer.



Those who had donated to the appeal for funds were invited to come along to see the bell and to take part in its blessing. A warm, dry morning saw some 14 out of around 30

donators assemble in the churchyard, (socially distanced and masked) to admire the bell.

Rev Maria thanked those who had been so generous in their donations (we have raised well over half the £6,000 required).

She blessed the bell with holy water asking that it should ring out for many years to call people cheerfully to prayer and to toll sadly for those who have died.



The bell hangers finished their work in the late afternoon and several of us were given a lesson on how to use the electronic chimer. Bill Buxton, who was so instrumental in initiating the project, was the first villager to set the bell chiming!

We look forward to hearing the bell chiming for Sunday services. If you would like to donate to the Bell it is not too late! February 2021 Update

As this third lockdown drags on, and with the end still not yet quite in sight, it is frustrating for us not to be able to open our doors to any of our 270 members, or indeed any public groups or bookings.

However, we are continuing to (try to) see the positive effects of this enforced closure, not only in terms of our own ability to deliver on changes to the building (about which many of you have been vocal), but also in terms of the support we've had from the wider community as we continue to raise funds for these improvements.

Progress is now well underway on the physical side of the project. In January we cleared the area at the back of the building to accommodate the new extension, with archaeological oversight led by Professor Josh Pollard of Southampton University. We now look forward to progressing out of the ground and completing the shell of the extension, which will house the kitchen and new disabled W.C.s.

Inside the main building, the old bar (which spanned 8 metres across both of the function rooms) has now been completed removed prior to remodelling.

The seating area next to the old bar is being converted into a bar store and a furniture store. The furniture store will allow us to de-clutter the main function room to increase its range of uses. The bar store will improve our ability to manage the bar area and in particular stock control.

The old "member's bar" or "Pool Room" area will evolve into a new, informal seating area with a café/bar feel, which will extend to the rear of the building, with views on to the sports field.

In making all this progress, inevitably we've uncovered some issues. Having removed all the ceilings to the existing flat-roofed extension, we have discovered some long-term damage caused by water coming in from the main roof, and are currently working on the assumption that the main roof will need to be replaced. Whilst this is an unwelcome surprise, we are grateful for the enormous support shown to the project by many of you who have stepped up in the last couple of weeks to help us reduce our project deficit. We remain around £25,000 short of our total, but are confident that we can find a way through to completion.

We continue to be interested in hearing from any additional donors, however big or small, to allow us to complete the programme of works and be open again for business in the early Summer. We are looking forward to welcoming back all our pupils very soon and I expect arrangements will be confirmed by the time this edition of Upper Kennet Valley News is published. However during the time we've been apart, we have remained a well-connected school community, though on site teaching, use of on-line technology and home visiting.

Supporting families

We know that a healthy mindset is paramount to effective learning and so during lockdown this has very much been a focus for me and my teaching team. Technology has been a life -line for many during this pandemic and an essential tool to support learning at home but we have also tried to create opportunities for our pupils and their families to have time together without technology, which is equally if not more important.

During this month, we have had some fun, visiting our families at home, as part of our "Wear a Christmas jumper day in February Fun Friday!" I was accompanied by a surprise visitor, Father Christmas, with gifts, to say well done to the children for all working so hard at home. We thought it was a good opportunity to get our Christmas jumpers out again before they become too small by the time December reaches us this year!

In recognition of the great efforts of our parents and the challenges and tough times many have faced during the pandemic, we distributed "Happy Valley-tine!" care gift bags to every home for Valentine's Day for our school parents. This included a few treats as well as well-being activities for the children. The gift bags included a kit for the children to make a worry doll to help express their feelings, a proud pocket to keep a record of things they are proud of in lockdown and a selection of labels to write their future hopes for the post lockdown period. I hope these will be lasting 'aide-memoires' for families once life returns to normal.

Learning at home

All classes have live daily morning check-ins with their class teacher and pupils and we continue to use variety of pre-recorded teaching videos by our teachers and other well-evaluated national teaching resources to enable curriculum learning. This means these can be accessed at any time of the day which many families find helpful especially in balancing the requirements of parents needing to work at home too. We completely recognise that this can be really difficult to achieve and just ask that everyone does the best they can and we are able to provide more individual support if needed. However, we have been really impressed by the work being submitted across all year groups showing creativity and progress and the pupils have all embraced the technology needed to support their home learning.

We continue to follow our curriculum plan and our focus subjects last term were science and geography. In geography this ranged from learning about our local landscape in reception and year one, to seas and oceans, climates around the world, mountains and physical features of these landscapes in the upper years. In science the subjects have included looking at materials, forces and magnets and electricity using real life objects to bring learning alive. We seek to learn about these specialist subjects though art work and literacy too, so other subjects come together to support subject learning.

Our PE providers PH Sports have kindly provided us with

some home PE activities called 'Lockdown Olympics' which families can dip in and out of. Children attending school have time every day for yoga, Jo Wicks exercise sessions or BBC Supermovers —combining maths times-tables and exercise! I understand that usually most of our families are able to go out and enjoy some fresh air or a walk most days (even in the rain!) which remains an important part of staying fit, both mentally and physically.

Supporting 'Love Marlborough Kids Meals'

We have been overwhelmed by the response of our school families and villagers to this campaign where we organised collection points in the villages for food items requested by the Love Marlborough team – in total we were proud to donate over 300 items. These will contribute to providing tasty hot meals for local families in need on a twice weekly basis.

Finally, we remain focused on the educational needs of our children and as a staff group have strategies in place to ensure that any children that have fallen behind will be supported with their learning. As spring begins to appear, we look forward to better times together.




