A View from the Rectory

By the time you read this article our much loved and widely respected late Queen, Elizabeth II, will have been laid to rest. Her family and the nation will have completed the formal period of mourning, and life as the cliché says 'goes on'. However, loss, grief, memory and the impact of losing someone we love lingers on. The last month has brought all sorts of things to the surface of our minds and emotions - unexpected things and no two people will experience loss and grief in exactly the same way.

Over and over in our prayers, privately, online and in church I have found myself deeply conscious of those who suffered a bereavement and who went through a funeral in these same few weeks. For some the public nature of the Queen's demise and the national period of mourning brought a sense of freedom - one lady said 'tears shed were not remarked on - even at work everyone was emotional. I could have a cry and no one even noticed - that was really helpful.' But a grieving son expressed it somewhat differently: 'I couldn't get there in time - I found I was very angry that some members of the royal family could travel to see the Queen before she died and there's a whole plan for managing her death, while my dad died suddenly and we had no warning and he was only 52. I mainly feel angry that the Queen (not at the queen) reigned much longer than my dad even lived.'

For others, losses of other kinds came to the surface, and I have found our conversations have turned once more to the various ways we have experienced loss over the last few years.

The spiritual impact of loss - loss of all sorts - on us, irrespective of whether we have an easily articulated faith or not, includes searching for meaning in the loss, change in beliefs, asking what might be the purpose of life.

We live in a culture where death and dying, loss of meaning and purpose, loss of confidence and even loss of identity is not discussed openly or very often even amongst people of faith. Except Christian Goths, of course, who might remind us that through death losing its sting through Jesus' resurrection it has become for us the ultimate healing as we are led through life to Life in the fullness of Heaven. Come to think of it, this isn't far from what Queen Elizabeth believed, is it, when she said in her Easter Pandemic message: 'As dark as death can be - particularly for those suffering with grief - light and life are greater. May the living flame of the Easter hope be a steady guide as we face the future.'

During the coming months we are inviting anyone experiencing loss of any kind to come to an evening of togetherness called Loss Café. With light touch, laughter and really good refreshments we will take these 'elephants' out from under the carpet and give them a jolly good shake out in the light. Do take the risk in coming - we are better and stronger dealing with these big things together. Whatever our paths, faith or none, we all need hope.





VISIT OF BISHOP DATA FROM SOUTH SUDAN

Bishop Data and his family, wife Agnes and 8 month old daughter Esther, visited our Benefice in August. After attending the Lambeth Conference he and his family were hosted by the Marlborough Deanery where they were able to meet many people and visit the local area. They enjoyed a morning tour of the Avebury Stones and then met Rev Maria in St James' Church, Avebury.



They were then entertained to lunch at the Waggon and Horses, Beckhampton where we had a chance to find out more about their lives in a refugee camp in Uganda, having been forced to flee the violence in South Sudan. He cycles some 50 miles back into South Sudan to minister in his Diocese of Morobo, where his 11 Archdeacons share 2 bibles and only 1 computer is available. Currently in Morobo there are no hospitals, clinics, schools or water supply as the rebels have destroyed everything. A huge re building programme will be required as they gradually try and return home. It is hoped that Marlborough Deanery and the Diocese of Morobo will establish a link and can support each other in prayer and practical ways. The Marlborough Deanery meets on 27 September to see if we wish to take this forward and work out how we can best support Bishop Data and his people.

This was the first time that the Avebury bells had been double muffled because they were unfit to ring when the last Monarch, King George VI, the Queen's father died.



Rev Gillian MacKichan 1934 – 2022

The church in West Overton was filled to capacity on Thursday 1st September for the funeral of Rev Gill MacKichan who died in Lockeridge on Saturday 20th August.

Gillian MacKichan, always known as Gill, was born in 1934 in London. Her early years were dominated by the Second World War, with evacuation first to Yorkshire and then to a boarding school, where she became Head Girl. She was passionate about sport and chose a career in Physical Education, training at Bedford College. Shortly after qualifying she met Alan MacKichan and they married in 1959. Alan was teaching at Marlborough College and Gill taught PE at Marlborough Grammar school until their sons Ian and Andrew were born.

In 1965 Alan became Housemaster of Summerfield House at the College, where Gill flourished in her caring role as Housemaster's wife. Their house was chosen to welcome girls when the school pioneered co-education. Former pupils remember with fondness and gratitude an elegant woman who put you instantly at ease and was always ready to listen and advise when necessary.

During this time Gill decided to change career. She trained as a Samaritan and then became a social worker, based at the Princess Margaret hospital in Swindon, specialising in foster care.

In 1982 Alan moved to Haileybury College in Hertfordshire as Deputy Headmaster. Gill then worked in Harlow in the Essex child guidance team. In 1992 Alan retired and they returned to Wiltshire living at West Bailey in Lockeridge. Gill worked in adoption placement in Swindon.

Since the late 80's she had been

Since the late 80's she had been contemplating ordination as a priest in the Church of England. She trained part-time while continuing her social work and was ordained as a deacon in Salisbury Cathedral in 1993 and then as a priest in 1994, one of the very first women to be ordained in the Church of England. She served the Kennet churches for the next 20 years.

Gill was always well informed about politics and national and international

events. She was a voracious reader particularly of novels, poetry and history. She loved art.

Her strong social conscience was played out particularly in her support of the Trussell Trust. Equality in all its forms was an important issue for her.

Gill had a lifelong passion for horses and she was never without one from her teenage years until her late 70's when her hips got the better of her. She was regularly seen around the parish on her beloved Rosie. Dogs were also an important part of her life.

Gill was a colourful character; she loved bright dramatic clothes. She was an enthusiastic, lively and interesting woman. Above all she was a kind and loving friend

Alan died in 2003. Gill is survived by Ian, Andrew and her three grandchildren, Millie, Alexander and Hugo.

I know that all of the children and families in the Kennet Valley School community enjoyed their school holidays and that the staff enjoyed it as well. The staff worked through the summer holidays to plan for the coming year. This included a new reading reward scheme and a new maths reward scheme. Both have been launched now that the children have returned to school and were explained to the parents and carers at a school meeting on Tuesday 13th September.

End of 2021/2022

The end of term was lovely, with an emotional goodbye to the year 6 children. This year they are all going to St Johns school, and I know that they will be amazing while they are there.

Leavers Service

Before the end of term, we held our annual Leavers Service. This year we held it in school because it was far too hot to walk up to West Overton church. It was lovely to hear the children talking about their experiences and memories of being at Kennet Valley School. We were delighted to welcome parents to this event too.

Year Six Residential

For the last 3 days of the summer term the wonderful Year Six children set off for their residential. This year they went to Kilve Court in Somerset and took part in a wide range of activities, which included raft building, archery, climbing and a visit to the beautiful beach there. Start of 2022/2023

We were really pleased that eleven new reception children started at the school this year. We also welcomed five older children who started in year 2 – 6. I know that I speak for the whole school community when I say a huge welcome to them – we all hope that they really love being in and learning in our lovely family school.

The three Rs and the three Cs

As a church school our values are really important, and as the headteacher I am passionate about 'living these values' as much as I can. The three overarching values for Kennet Valley are Curiosity, Compassion and Courage – the three Cs. We talked to the children about these and reflected on them in many lessons. I hope that we demonstrate these in the everyday work that we do, and when we do unique events such as fund raising for charities. Currently we have a food drive for Love Marlborough Kids Meals called the £2 challenge.

This year we have also introduced the three Rs! These are the three 'golden' rules that we ask children to observe when at school (and at home). These rules ask the children, and staff, to be Responsible, be Respectful and be Resilient. Again, as with the values, we have explored what these words means and how we should demonstrate that we are living by them in everyday life.

Our children are all amazing, but we hope that the three Cs and Rs will make their lives even better both within and out of school.

AVEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Headlines from Avebury Parish Council's meeting on 6 September 2022

A4361: The SID will soon move to its location at the entrance of the community Sports and Social Club. We are buying new batteries to provide more reliable operation.

B4003: A member of the public asked about a notice relating to the road. This concerns statutory public consultation about a small extension to the primrose lining designed better to define the layby, which may be remodelled soon.

Community Exhibition Space (the Chapel): We agreed to sign the National Trust's lease, which becomes effective from 1 October and runs for three years.

Defibrillator: We heard that donations will help fund the proposed additional

defibrillators in Beckhampton and Rawlins Park (the latter being subject to support from the site's new owners).

Flooding: It was agreed to ask Wiltshire Council to clear the drain outside the Red Lion and the ditch along AVE22.

Great Chalk Way: We heard that the Ramblers Association was looking for a place to install an information board detailing the route of the Great Chalk Way. It was agreed that the Chapel would be the ideal location.

National Trust: The monthly update underlined the Trust's road safety concerns given increased footfall from the ASSC/pay and display car park. It was decided to ask ASSC to consider posting signs inviting pedestrians not to walk unsafely along the A4361 but safely through the henge. The Trust said that it would like the PC to consider setting up a commercial/business group consisting of local businesses as a forum to discuss upcoming events and

other matters of interest. On request of a member of the public, the council agreed to raise concerns about trespass/ camping in the beech copse that runs along the southern edge of Rawlins Park with the Trust.

Parish Steward: Wiltshire Council has responded positively to the Council's request for an increase in the number of hours the steward spends each month on work in and around Avebury. The allocation has been doubled to eight.

Ridgeway: A member of the public asked why so many vehicles were camping on the Ridgeway close to Overton Hill. We agreed to ask Wiltshire Council for an explanation.

Update from the National Trust -October 2022

A Message from the Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson

I've now been 'in the job' of PCC for a year, and if there is one thing that's been made abundantly clear to me, it's that your confidence in policing is not where I want it to be.

Whilst there are clearly some exceptional individual officers, overall, there have been gaps in the service you receive. In the past year, I have made practical steps to address them, such as the purchasing of effective technology such as drones and ensuring more officers are deployed to the rural crime team.

The damage done by crimes such as hare coursing, criminal damage and theft have a massive impact on the rural community and history shows that at times of recession, farms become targets.

I regularly speak to farmers and I'm all too aware of the reasons why you feel that reporting crime is not worthwhile. In my Police and Crime Plan, I've committed to

ensure Wiltshire Police takes these crimes seriously and deals with them effectively.

This is why I've taken steps to ensure the rural crime team has the capabilities and staffing it needs.

As part of this commitment, Wiltshire Police has introduced online crime reporting specifically for rural crime. The form takes about ten minutes and is picked up by the same people who answer 101 calls.

It's vital that to build up an overall picture and identify patterns of criminal activity, all crime is reported, no matter how small it may seem.

As this has only recently been introduced, I welcome your feedback about how the system is working. It's only through working together that we can stop these crimes from happening and make Wiltshire a safer place to live and work.


